Read the book, using these questions to guide your thoughts:

What do you learn from the opening frame that the characters in the book do not know? 1. What does God think of Job? (1:1, 1:8) b. What is the cause of Job's blessing? (1:10) c. What is the reason for Job's suffering? d. What does God value in Job's behavior? (2:3) 2. What is the hedge that Job complains about in 3:23? Hint: compare v. 1:10. Is Job wrong in making this complaint? How? 3. What do Job's friends think is the cause of Job's suffering? (4:8, 5:17, 8:20, 11:11, 15:20, 18:21, 20:29, 22:5) 4. Why do Job's friends condemn him? (Hint: think about 8:3, what they think Job is doing.) 5. What does Job think is the cause of his suffering? (9:17) Is he right? Explain your answer. What does Job value even more than his life? (27:2-6) How does this explain the rejection of 6. his wife's advice? (2:9) Why does Elihu burn with anger against Job? (32:2) Why is he angry with Job's friends? 7. (32:3) What does that tell you about the status of the argument so far?

The summary of Elihu's argument is 37:23-24. Is this true? (cp. Gal. 6:7)
